She also drew inspiration for her future career. Blazie is graduating with a degree in human development and family studies and is headed to the University of Georgia's child life master's program. She hopes to return to the Palouse to work as a child life specialist.

Ethan Sunseri's college career began as a quest to improve his fitness as a competitive runner. But through his time in the College of Education, Health and Human Sciences, he honed

a passion for helping others live healthier, happier lifestyles. Sunseri interned at Vandal Health Education, providing health education to students about well-being topics through events and workshops. He also volunteered to help with the Vandal track and field/cross country team for a semester. After graduation, Sunseri would like to work with communities to create opportunities for people to engage in healthy lifestyles.

As a young girl in Zimbabwe, <u>Shalom Masango</u> dreamed of being an airplane pilot. She's not flying yet, but Shalom's senior design project in the College of Engineering focused on improving aircraft flight. She embraced the U of I community, meeting peers and mentors through the Society of Women Engineers. And Shalom represented the U of I well as one of the featured students on <u>The College Tour</u>. She's earning her degree in mechanical engineering and landed a position as an associate manufacturing engineer with Schweitzer Engineering Laboratories.

The seeds for Alejandro Jimenez's education in crop science were planted when he worked summers as a laborer for Godina Farms, near Caldwell. They came to fruition at the U of I, where he excelled as a member of the first Chobani Scholars cohort and jumped at opportunities outside the classroom.
