



Library Launches VERSO, A Platform for Promoting and Preserving Scholarly Work and Research

The University of Idaho Library is excited to announce the launch of **VERSO (Vandal Expertise, Research, and Scholarship Online)**, a cutting-edge platform for preserving and promoting the university's

research and creative output. VERSO will serve as a hub for showcasing the expertise of faculty, students, and staff of the U of I by associating the full spectrum of their scholarly work with a single, centralized profile.

Key Benefits of VERSO:

- Increased Visibility: VERSO increases the impact of research and creative projects by making them more discoverable online, enhancing researchers' visibility on platforms like Google and ORCID.
- Automated Updates: Integrating with external platforms like ORCID and other scholarly publishers, VERSO automatically updates researcher profiles with newly published research outputs, streamlining profile management.
- Departmental Support: VERSO provides analytics to promote department work and preserves research-related products, helping to prevent data loss during faculty or student transitions.

Faculty researchers can edit their profiles by signing in to the platform with their UI credentials. Other U of I community members can <u>request their</u> <u>own VERSO profile</u>.


Plant, Soil, and Entomological Sciences Records

Plant, Soil, and Entomological Sciences Records digital collection highlights a small percentage of materials showing a variety of insects and parasites that were photographed for research purposes by CALS at their Kimberly and Twin Falls Research and Extension Centers, from the 1930s to the 1960s.

The Library's A/V Studio Gets an Upgrade

Did you know the U of I Library has an audiovisual production studio?

This summer, the Studio moved to a larger space in Room 122 on the Library's first floor, offering students, staff, and faculty enhanced capabilities to record, edit, and mix audiovisual content for teaching, learning, and creative projects. Faculty and staff can produce high-quality video lectures and instructional materials using eGlass and other Studio equipment, such as microphones, an audio interface, lights, and a green screen.

Additionally, the Library provides a range of audiovisual equipment for checkout, including field recorders, a USB microphone kit, a Canon DSLR camera kit, video cameras, tripods, and ring lights.


Sample projects you can create in the Studio:




Featured Resources for October 2024


In this issue, we're highlighting <u>SciFinder</u> (CAS SciFinder), a powerful database that provides researchers with access to sources in chemistry,

health and medical sciences, and other related disciplines. In addition to searching by keyword, substance name, patent number, and CAS Registry Number (CAS RN), researchers can also draw and search by chemical structures.

Depending on your search, results may include substances, reactions, references, and suppliers.



If results are narrowed to 'References,' researchers can further limit their results by options such as document type, substance role, publication year, organization, and formulation purpose. Each reference result includes a link to find the full text of the publication, additional information about the substances discussed, CAS Concepts and MEDLINE Medical Subject Headings, and a citation map, which can be expanded to display references and cited-by sources.

Finding Me by Viola Davis (2022)

Viola Davis's autobiography of her years growing up in New England is gripping and honest but not bitter. The residual impact of the poverty and abuse that marked her parents' lives was very evident as she reflects on her past and that of her family. As Davis states, she wrote this book "for anyone who is searching for a way to understand and overcome a complicated past, let go of shame, and find acceptance." However, Davis' story is very inspiring and reflects the strength she found to move beyond her past to find her purpose and inspire others. I found Davis's story a fascinating read, and it gave me a lot of respect for her resilience as a

person and an actor.

American Dirt by Jeanine Cummins (2022)

American Dirt is a fictionalized account of a mother and her son's journey to the United States from Mexico to save their lives from the influence of the drug cartel in Acapulco. A traumatic event in their family forces Lydia and her son Luca to leave their upper middle-class life and home and join with others who are trying to cross the Mexico-U.S. border. While the news media tends to portray a stereotypical view of people who cross the border into the U.S., this fictional story gave me an eye-opening view of the myriad of reasons behind why people, from all walks of life, may choose to cross into the U.S., and the harrowing experiences that they may face in trying to leave their homes to make a better life for themselves in a new place.
